I have also established an equality working party and one of our collective aims is in ensuring that our curriculum resources positively reflect diversity. I want to ensure all our students can see themselves in the learning resources we provide.

I recall what it felt like being a gay teenager in a comprehensive school in the Midlands in the 1980's. This was a time when Section 28 was introduced and I understand how it felt like to be an outsider who was not provided with both the safety and the support that all teenagers deserve. Thankfully so much has changed. However, I never want any student in our community to feel such isolation. It is of vital importance that all our students feel safe in their school; by which I mean safe to themselves. I also want all students to feel proud of their identity and of their cultural and social background. To beyond acceptance to a celebration of difference. And I believe we collectively have the actions and drive to make this possible.
