Remembering Captain Sir Tom Moore

Captain Moore was born on the 30th April 1920 and passed away on the 2nd February 2021 due to Covid-19, aged 100. On 24th April, he also featured in a song, 'You'll never walk alone' which soon became the UK's top hit, making him the oldest person to ever get to number one hit in the UK. On the 16th April 2020 there was a breakthrough for Tom, he finished his one-hundredth lap of the garden and vowed to continue walking. The UK supported him with every step and money remained pouring in. On 17th July, he was knighted for his great efforts and all the money he had raised. Tom Moore was very positive and truly believed that things 'would get better' as he told the BBC Breakfast show on Christmas day of 2020.

Tom Moore was an incredible person who served his country not only once but twice by fighting and raising so much money. The NHS and UK will forever be indebted to this amazing man. Thank you, Captain Sir Tom Moore, rest in peace.
