

## What Is Harmful Sexual Behaviour?


Can include, but not limited to:

- Unwanted sexual comments, touching, or behaviours
- Sharing indecent images (nudes or sexual content)
- Pressuring someone to send images
- Sharing someone else's private content



### Real-Life Scenarios

- Scenario 1: Someone shares an image of themselves with a boyfriend/girlfriend.
- Scenario 2: The above happens, but it then gets forwarded.
- Scenario 3: Someone pressures another person for a nude.
- Scenario 4: A group shares an image in a group chat "as a joke."



### Why People Share: Let's Be Honest

- Pressure from a partner
- Wanting attention or validation
- Thinking "everyone else is doing it"
- Not understanding the risks



These aren't just bad choices...

They're behaviours that hurt others and can break the law.



## The Law – What Does It Say? (UK Law)


- It is illegal to take, possess, or share sexual images of anyone under 18 even if it's of yourself.
- This applies even if both people are underage and agree to it.
- The Sexual Offences Act 2003 treats these as criminal offences.
- Child Pornography: in criminal law, any visual depiction of a minor (a person who has not reached the age of consent) engaging in sexually explicit activity.

### Consequences - Legally

- You could be investigated by the police
- You could face charges and prosecution under The Sexual Offences Act 2003
- It could be flagged on an enhanced DBS check
- It might affect college/university admissions
- Could be classed as a sex offence



## Consequences: Personally and Socially

- Reputational damage people will remember
  - Humiliation and bullying
  - Damage to friendships or relationships
- Employers or colleges seeing past behaviour online
  - Losing control of the images/narrative



#### Consequences: In School

- Mobile phone confiscated for significant period of time.
   Harmful Sexual Behaviours Referral
   Referrals to Police and other authorities.
- - First offence: 2-day suspension
  - **Second offence:** 5-day suspension
- Third offence: Movement to another school or permanent exclusion

This is about safety, not punishment. We have a zero-tolerance policy because we take your wellbeing seriously — and the wellbeing of others.



### How to Say No

- "I'm not comfortable with that."
- "That's not okay I'm not getting involved."
- "I don't want to do that/I don't think you should do that"

If you need help with someone pressuring you to send inappropriate messages/images, talk to a trusted adult, Head of Year, or safeguarding lead.





- The sooner you act, the more can be done to help!
- <u>Tell a trusted adult</u> Parent, Form Tutor, Teacher, Head of Year, safeguarding lead – anyone that you know will help you.
- <u>DO NOT FORWARD</u> Remember: sharing is illegal under the age of 18!
- <u>Report Remove</u>: Report Remove is here to help young people under 18 in the UK to confidentially report sexual images and videos of themselves and remove them from the internet
- <u>Take It Down</u>: This service is one step you can take to help remove online nude, partially nude, or sexually explicit photos and videos taken before you were 18.

### Message to Parents -Help Us Keep Your Child Safe

- Please talk with your child about respectful online behaviour
- Check privacy settings and app usage
- Help them understand that real-life consequences follow digital actions
